

Opposing State Constitutional Changes: Answering Essential Questions

Included in this edition of the Louisiana Retired Teachers Association (LRTA) summer newsletter is a message from our new president Clyde Hamner, a summary of bills and outcomes regarding retirement legislation that were tracked during the 2024 regular legislative session, and perhaps most importantly, information on why LRTA opposes a new state constitution or state constitutional changes.

A MESSAGE FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



I believe by answering essential questions regarding our current and potential new state constitution, it is in the voter's best interest to oppose constitutional changes until we take the time and energy to vet, discuss, and deliberate ramifications for changes to our current state constitution.

What is the purpose of a state constitution?

The state constitution is the keystone of the law of Louisiana ensuring the rights of individuals, describing the distribution and power of state officials and local government, establishes the state and city civil service systems, creates and defines the operation of state lottery, and the manner of revising the constitution.

Why change the current state constitution?

Many lawmakers have asserted the current constitution is too long and needs to be simplified like other states. There's truth that the constitution is very long but that's because voters over the years have approved amendments that clarify the current document, many of which include protections listed in the purpose of the constitution. The fact is, simplification sounds good, but there's been very little discussion with the public regarding which protections will be modified or removed. There's also been discussion about making constitutional changes in order to free up more money in the state budget to deal with an expected budget shortfall next year. However, we don't know if that means taking monies that are already protected and dedicated to another source in the constitution. There has already been conversation regarding moving tax protections that could have negative consequences for most citizens in our state.

Are certain aspects of the current state constitution exempt from discussion in the proposed constitutional convention?

Some amendments were adopted that would exempt certain protections from the proposed constitutional convention, including educational funding. retirement, and homestead exemptions. Scholars have pointed out that once the constitution is reconsidered nothing is exempt as demonstrated during our state's last constitutional convention in 1974. While House Bill 800 (HB800) did not pass, Senate president Cameron Henry said legislators might still convene an August special session to review the foundational state's governance document. This means the amendments to HB 800 would no longer apply. This also implies education and retirement are no longer exempt, putting these and other protections at risk.

Why rush the process of writing and voting on a new state constitution by November 2024?

The Louisiana Retired Teachers Association (LRTA) supports development of sound policy that would potentially become our new or modified state governing document, but we need to take the time to discuss and deliberate any changes to the state constitution that has served our state well since 1974. In the past the state has taken at least two years to conduct a convention and make recommendations while seeking public input before submitting a new document to the public for consideration. Currently the plan is for committees to meet in July and make recommendations during a special session for considering articles to change during a two-week period in August. That's an extremely short period of time to develop a new document given the length of our current constitution. That leaves only two months to inform the public about the changes to a document that could remove protections and change the way we govern our citizens at the local and state levels.

Who represents the voters at the proposed state constitutional convention?

During prior constitutional conventions, both in Louisiana and other states, delegates campaigned and were elected by the voters of the state. Under the new scenario, the legislators themselves would develop the proposed changes for the public to vote on during the fall of 2024. This is problematic for several reasons. First, many legislators did not run on a platform for constitutional change. Therefore, they do not know our views on what kinds of changes might be made in the constitution. Second, we had a significant turnover of 48 new legislators being elected last fall. Finally, in terms of representing the people, 68 current legislators ran unopposed. It stands to reason that if we elected delegates for this important task there would be great interest from the voters in creating a sound document that governs our great

Why oppose a new state constitution?

LRTA opposes the state constitutional convention and the writing of a new constitution or constitutional changes, because procedurally the time necessary to thoughtfully deliberate change without appropriate input and notice from the residents of Louisiana could create a document that would be detrimental to the citizens of our state.

For these reasons we encourage members, and perhaps most importantly, all voters in Louisiana, to oppose constitutional changes now and in the future.

A MESSAGE FROM OUR LRTA PRESIDENT



In 1991 I made a promise on behalf of all retirees to my mentor, Warren Sevin. Warren preceded me on the TRSL Board of Trustees 1978-1991 from and was instrumental in getting the 1984 constitutional protections retirement systems in the State Constitution, Article 10 Section 29. Warren instilled in me the passion to protect the benefits of all retirees and the promise I made was twofold: to keep those protections in the constitution and never let our retirement system fall prev to the legislature or any elected official. Over the years, we managed to defeat legislative attempts and attempts by elected officials to weaken our control of our constitutionally protected funds. We now face another potential threat—a new constitution.

Led by the efforts of LRTA, a convention bill failed to pass, but the Senate president was quoted saying, "Lawmakers haven't shut the door on it completely yet." That said, I predict a special session to bring it back since the convention is the Governor's top priority. Honoring my promise to Warren, I will continue to oppose any efforts that threaten our constitutionally-protected retirement funds.

The governor picked 27 of his own delegates to take part in a convention; the rest of the delegates would be the members of the House and Senate, 171 total. For the 1974 convention, voters elected delegates having a clear purpose, explicit goals, transparency, and specific procedural direction. These measures are currently unknown, and will continue to be, if the convention is proposed again. That is a clear-cut issue that contributes to my hesitancy to support a convention and my suspicion of even a limited constitutional convention.

Furthermore, the limited period to revise the constitution makes it difficult to fully explore the implications of rewriting a complex document—two weeks—the 1974 convention took 110 days.

Most importantly, the public is deprived of participation in the process when citizens should have an opportunity to voice their opinions and actively take part in shaping the state's foundational document.

There can be potential benefits of a new constitution, but with benefits **Updating** risks. come constitution can address current and remove outdated provisions. But with the expiration of the state sales tax next year, will those so-called outdated provisions and current needs simply give the governor and legislature easier access to constitutionally protected funds? The expectation is that the debates will focus on which funds with constitutional protections should be removed. Supporters of this say removing these protections would allow better and more flexible budgeting. But at whose expense?

The convention should be an opportunity to focus on specific issues that the 216 piecemeal amendments may not adequately address. It should simplify and streamline the constitution by consolidating and reorganizing amendments, making it easier for citizens to understand. These outcomes are good, but in doing so, a new constitution could remove constitutional protections for education funding or protections for retirement funds, making them more accessible and easier to use by the governor and legislature if there is a shortfall in the state budget. Remember, the state sales tax goes away next year. That money must be replaced.

A convention can reexamine the balance of power among branches of government. The delegates may propose changes to enhance checks and balances or clarify the roles of different institutions. It is another risk. That balance of power should be equal for all three branches-executive, judicial, and legislative-and institutions, such as state boards, should be free of political influence to work effectively.

Clearly, the probable risks associated with a convention outweigh the unlikely benefits. Governor Landry's goal is to present a new constitution to voters on November 5. On that day, I will keep my promise to Warren!

2024 LEGISLATIVE SESSION RECAP

The legislative session began on March 11 and ended on June 2, 2024. Provided below is a list of bills that were pre-filed and/or introduced for consideration by the legislature during the 2024 legislative session that potentially impacted retired educators and/or the retirement system. In accordance with LRTA legislative priorities for 2024, LRTA's position on each bill is stated in red below, with its outcome during the session next to it.


CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION

House Bill No. 800 by Rep. Beau Beaullieu

This bill proposed a rewrite of the Louisiana State Constitution. It states that there is a need to address a number of areas that require constitutional change, that the constitution restricts the legislature from effectively addressing state and constituent needs, and that revision of the state constitution is needed to address the state's critical needs and transition provisions that do not constitute the fundamental and foundational law of this state to statutory provisions, and to craft provisions that allow legislative solutions without the need to constantly amend the constitution.

LRTA Opposed. Bill did not pass.

Representative Larry Bagley played a crucial role in protecting retirement pensions when HB 800 was on the House floor for debate in early May. He proposed an amendment that exempts retirement from the new Constitutional Convention. It passed without objection.

RETURN TO WORK

House Bill No. 17 by Rep. Charles Owen

This bill provides for the reemployment of contract or corporate contract teachers in the Teachers' Retirement System of Louisiana (TRSL). It allows TRSL retirees to be reemployed through a contract or corporate contract without suspension of their retirement benefit.

LRTA Neutral. Bill did not pass.

Act No.___ (formerly House Bill 967) by Rep. Neil Riser

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This bill provides for reemployment of teachers in the Teachers' Retirement System of Louisiana (TRSL) in a critical shortage position.

Critical shortage areas without suspension of benefits are applicable to the following:

- Retirees who retired on or before June 30, 2020, and who return to work in such a position on a part-time basis.
- 2. Retirees who retire after June 30, 2020, and who return to work in such a position on a full time or part-time basis.

LRTA No Position. Bill passed.

OPTIONAL RETIREMENT PLAN

Act No. 109 (formerly House Bill 31) by Rep. Barbara Freiberg

This bill provides a window for active, contributing Optional Retirement Plan (ORP) participants to join the Teachers' Retirement System of Louisiana's (TRSL) defined benefit plan. The ORP is a defined contribution retirement plan similar to a 401(k). Most

participants are university employees.

LRTA Neutral. Bill passed.

House Resolution 169 by Rep. Tony Bacala

This resolution establishes a task force to study the Optional Retirement Plan within the Teachers' Retirement System of Louisiana (TRSL) and to report its findings to the House Committee on Retirement not later than 90 days prior to the 2025 regular session.

LRTA Neutral. Sent to Secretary of State (passed).

INVESTMENTS/ESG-RELATED

(ENVIRONMENT, SOCIAL, GOVERNANCE)

Senate Bill No. 5 by Senator Blake Miguez

This bill requires fiduciaries for public retirement systems to make investment decisions based solely on financial factors. The law requires that all investment decisions made by third-party service providers, defined as asset managers and proxy advisors, must be made using solely pecuniary factors. It also defines non-pecuniary factors to include factors aimed at furthering social, political, or ideological goals, objectives or outcomes.

It prohibits the use of nonpecuniary factors that include any action taken, or factor considered, with any purpose to further social, political, or ideological goals, objectives, or outcomes.

LRTA Opposed. Bill did not pass.

Substitute House Bill No. 981 (formerly HB 902) by Senator Michael Melerine

This bill provides relative to the voting of proxies by public retirement systems on shareholder sponsored proposals.

The proposed law prohibits public retirement systems from voting a proxy relating to a shareholder-sponsored proposal submitted to an issuer of securities pursuant to specified federal law in a manner that is consistent with the recommendation of a proxy advisory firm unless one of the following applies:

- The firm's recommendation is consistent with the recommendation of the board of directors of the issuer of the securities.
- 2. The firm has agreed that its recommendation, advice, and analysis regarding the shareholder-sponsored proposal is in compliance with present law regarding prudent investments by retirement systems and is in the best financial interest of the system.

The proposed law states that a proxy advisory firm is an entity that is engaged in the business of providing proxy voting advice, research, analysis, ratings, or recommendations to a retirement system and that has a direct contractual relationship with the system.

LRTA Opposed. Bill did not pass.

WEP/GPO

(WINDFALL ELIMINATION PROVISION) / (GOVERNMENT PENSION OFFSET)

House Concurrent Resolution No. 20 (original bill HR 82) by Rep. Mike Johnson

This resolution requests
Congress and other state
legislatures to request that
Congress review and eliminate
the provisions of federal law
which reduce Social Security
benefits for persons receiving
pension from federal, state, or
local government retirement
systems.

LRTA Supports. Sent to Secretary of State (passed).

SERVICE CREDITS

Act No. 46 (formerly Senate Bill No. 1) by Senator Ed Price

This bill provides for the transfer of service credit from one public retirement system to another. The system from which a member transfers such credit will transfer to the receiving system employer contributions, and excludes excess contributions in certain situations.

LRTA Neutral. Bill passed.


April 14 and ends no later than June 12, 2025

REPEAL GPO / WEP IN WASHINGTON D.C.

Recently, we have seen new activity and discussions surrounding the repeal of the Government Pension Offset (GPO) and Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP). The GPO and WEP unfairly penalize Louisiana's retired teachers by reducing or eliminating their spousal Social Security benefit or their own Social Security benefit. Janis Hernandez has been a very vocal advocate in repealing GPO and WEP.

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
